Always give people the respect they obviously deserve. We don't know their joys and tragedies, their achievements and failures, and all that is needed to open people up a bit is to get to know them and ask the right questions.

People are endlessly fascinating and the older a person is, the more fascinating and interesting their recollections become because the world has changed so much.

Do it before they leave us or you may only find out about them at their funeral.



A Happy New Year to you all. The Council has been successful in obtaining a grant from Lord Clinton's Charitable Trust to purchase a defibrillator for Yettington. This will probably be placed in the Phone Box, once repairs have been carried out and permission obtained from BT, to reconnect the electricity supply. Our thanks to Kate Ponting, of Clinton Devon Estates, for assisting us with the application. We have also been fortunate in obtaining a grant for an SID – a sign to warn motorists to slow down. This will assist the Speedwatch Groups in their valuable work.

The Parish Council and District Councillors have given full support towards plans by local volunteers to purchase the Sir Walter Raleigh public house for the Community. We wish them every success in this exciting venture, which should be of huge benefit to local residents and visitors.

Unfortunately, we had to cancel the "Meet the Communities" day, which was planned for January, but this will be re-launched as soon as Covid cases in the area reduce. There is much enthusiasm for this event, which should be a great occasion for residents to discover more about the thriving local groups. ## Drake's Church of England Primary School

The new school term had started with great energy and enthusiasm by all of the staff and pupils.

In our first week back a football team from Drake's and Otterton took part in the EFL KIDS CUP 2022. Up on the hill at Exeter University on a cold rainy January day, the EFL Kids Cup 2022 was underway. The group stage saw us up against teams from far and wide across Devon. A knife edge game got us started that we just lost against Landscore (3:2) but we found our feet and went on to chalk up two fantastic wins against Yeo Valley (4:0) and St Leonards (3:0). The final group game was against the best team in the group Bradworthy who despite their long journey to Exeter were fit and sharp. We matched them well and what was another knife edge finish saw us lose 4:3 in the final minutes. Six points at the group stage wasn't enough to place us in the top two for the cup competition. However, we finished as the highest scoring third place team from the four groups with a fantastic 12 goals! This got us a bye into the semi-finals of the plate competition! We watched the other teams battling for their places in the semis and played a friendly to keep us warm against Ladysmith, who had been knocked out earlier, coming away with a 3:2 victory against a lively team. Our semi-final was against Broadclyst who were fluent, fast and tall – the first team we'd seen heading the ball from corners. We played well but couldn't match a team that clearly plays a lot of 6-aside together. We lost 3:0 with Broadclyst going on to win the plate competition final. We played a third-place play-off again against Beacon where some of our team faced their teammates from Exmouth Town and Brixington Blues. A well spirited game saw Beacon come out as third place with a 3:1 win.

The children played brilliantly, and they were a credit to both schools – well done everyone!

A big surprise was seeing a flock of 34 white fronted geese on the newly created marsh north of South Farm Road. I have been told it's the 1980's since a similar number of this species was seen in our area. There are up to 6 black tailed godwits now using this area. Little grebe, redshank water rail & snipe can now be seen in the river or along its banks; although it takes time & patience to be able to find some of these birds. Finally a female sparrow hawk paid a visit to the bird feeders in our garden, presumably looking for a victim, but left without success.



### **Our Churchyards**

In early January, there are some daisies, celandines and primroses around the Churchyards and the violets and snowdrops were already in flower near the Yettington Road gate.

#### Somewhere to Shelter

Although January and February may not be the best months to see wildlife in our local churchyard or burial ground, these spaces will still be acting as havens for a variety of animals.

Piles of vegetation, such as leaf litter, may shelter a hedgehog, which rolls up in the leaves until it resembles a leafy football. Corners of twigs, branches or stones will be used by hibernating newts, frogs and toads. Frogs can pick up the colour of their surroundings during the winter - for instance they sometimes emerge a pinky-red colour if they are on a red clay soil.

The ancient churchyard walls contain nooks and crannies for slow worms and a multitude of invertebrates. Lizards may be underground in burrows or cracks, and queen bumblebees will be overwintering in old vole holes.

Butterfly eggs will likely be in areas of tussocky grass. The Holly Blue butterfly lays



eggs on holly leaves in the autumn, ready to emerge in spring. Any ivy may be sheltering small birds, such as wrens, whilst the dense foliage of yew trees shelters bird species such as the beautiful goldcrest. Old trees, such as veteran oaks or yews, may have bats roosting behind loose bark, or owls sheltering within holes.

So next time you wander through the bare looking Churchyard – remember that is it still a haven for wildlife - waiting to emerge once spring arrives.

#### Candlemas Bells

Many snowdrops found in churchyards and monastic sites have been planted as a symbol of purity and hope. The first known cultivation of snowdrops in the UK was recorded in 1597 and, while it is thought that it was pilgrims who brought this beautiful flower to our shores, it was the Victorians who enthusiastically planted them in churchyards and cemeteries.



Snowdrops go by over 30 different local names including dew drops, eve's tear and February fair-maids. They are also known as Candlemas bells.

In the Middle Ages Candlemas (held on the 2nd of February) was the day when everyone in the parish brought their candles to church to be blessed by the

priest. This was to ward off evil spirits. After a procession, and the blessing, the candles were all lit and set before the statue of the Virgin Mary. The snowdrop was the flower gathered to decorate the church at that time, so took on the name of that ancient tradition.

Back in those times snowdrops were used to treat headaches. Today in modern medicine a compound from the bulb has been used to develop a dementia treatment. As well as brightening up the churchyard, they are a great energy source for emerging queen bumblebees at this time of year.

### **Churchyard Working Party**

On Friday 17<sup>th</sup> December, 13 volunteers completed the tasks for the day. Derek, our compost supremo, went up in the afternoon to finish the third and fourth bins - there's dedication! Two visitors from Weymouth commented on how neat and tidy the Garden of Remembrance was looking - thanks go to Norman who tidies and strims the grass ... the day before Norman's work it had been a scene of devastation with molehills everywhere, wind-blown flowers and pots overturned. It is nice to know that all our work is appreciated.

We had an amazing 14 volunteers on Friday 21st January despite the cold. Fortunately, many jobs were located in the warmth of the sun. Most of the listed jobs were completed apart from painting all the steps' edges. The compost bin area behind the shed is almost complete and, once we have new dustbins, we'll be able to make composting, recycling and rubbish disposal easier for all. We are also planning to have two more grassy paths going across the main Churchyard to improve accessibility

The next three Churchyard Working Party dates in 2022 are Friday 18<sup>th</sup> February, 18<sup>th</sup> March and 22nd April - we hope to see you at one ... 10.00!

## RSPB Aylesbeare

As we start another year on the Heath, we can look back on a busy 2021. It was full of habitat creation, infrastructure repairs and lots of scrub clearance to maintain the rare low-land heath. To thank our volunteers for all the hard work they have put in throughout the year, we had an outside Christmas lunch during December at Venn Ottery Hill. Of course, we made use of them while they were there and got some jobs done! We had a group clearing and burning scrub, tree guards were set up around newly planted trees and some trees by the roadside were removed.

Whilst we have an excellent group of weekday volunteers, we also have a Sunday work party once a month for those who are busy during the week. During winter this often involves scrub clearance with a potato baked on the bonfire for lunch. If you are interested in joining us on our weekly Wednesday and Thursday work parties or on the 2nd Sunday of the month, contact: Aylesbeare.Common@rspb.org.uk. It's a great way to meet new people, get to know your local habitat and learn more about nature all whilst keeping fit. Additionally, we have surveys going on throughout the year that you can get involved with. Currently, we have the winter bird transect and Hen Harrier surveys.

We have also been working on the Stockland Turbaries, clearing the invasive species of Rhododendron and Cherry Laurel. Rhododendron and Cherry Laurel pose similar problems in a woodland block, in suitable conditions, the species will outcompete native plants making it difficult for woodland flora to grow. As the light is blocked, the understorey remains bare which in turn prevents woodland regeneration. They are also unsuitable for animal grazing due to their toxicity meaning they can often grow unchecked. Funding available from the woodland management grant can be used to remove Cherry Laurel and Rhododendron. We were contracted on behalf of the Stockland parish council to remove these species and have spent a couple of weeks over the course of December and January clearing and burning. The toxic compounds in the species (such as cyanide) break down when burnt at high temperatures so don't pose a further risk to human health! It is important to control the spread as this allows woodland regeneration and prevents further costs associated with control. We also helped the National Trust at Branscombe with some access projects at the end of December.

A new residential volunteer arrived within the new year and we have another due to arrive later this month. This not only increases our weekday workforce but provides a great learning opportunity for young people wanting to find a career in conservation.

As for 2022, we are continuing to roll out our winter work programme to meet habitat and species management objectives. We also hope to continue our involvement with management at Venn Ottery Hill. In the spring it comes to the end of its 5-year aftercare obligations and we will continue to work with Aggregate Industries to manage the site.



Mud; mucky, marvellous but misunderstood.

At this time of year, it is common to find a moan or two in my inbox about mud. It is annoying to slip along a wet section of footpath or find soil tracked onto roads by agricultural vehicles. Even in places where it should be, the brown stuff is undervalued. Soil and mud are much more than inconvenient dirt. So, does mud need a rebrand?

**World Wetland Day** is marked on 2<sup>nd</sup> February. This year's theme is Action for People and Nature, highlighting the need to take action, to value, restore and manage wetlands sustainably. The *Lower Otter Restoration Project* is taking action for people and nature by delivering a natural solution to help adapt to climate change and restore lost wetland. The historic earth embankment will be breached next year. Seawater will silently cover the valley floor for the first time in 200 years but as the tide retreats it will leave mud, lots of mud, enough mud to cover 156 football fields. This change is one that should be welcomed.

Where mud is deposited at the mouth of rivers the layers form mudflats. Other local rivers like the Exe have extensive coastal systems including mud flats. In parts of the lower Otter valley where vegetation has been removed to allow the water to drain effectively, the open views already allow a glimpse of the changes ahead and migrant birds are already making the most of the new habitats. When it is estuary once more, over time, salt tolerant plants will colonise the mud helping it developing into areas of both mudflats and saltmarsh.

Saltmarshes provide habitats of high biodiversity value, deliver coastal protection from sea level rise and storms and lock-up valuable carbon. Wading birds and the juvenile stages of many marine fish species exploit the food and protection provided by the networks of muddy creeks. Wetlands cover just 5 to 8% of the world's surface but lock up 20 to 30% of the world's carbon. Carbon is captured both by growing plants and in the sediments beneath. A single hectare of saltmarsh can capture up to two tonnes of carbon a year, locking it away for centuries.

With all this happening right under our feet, it is definitely time to recognise all these benefits and start to champion marvellous mud!

Volunteers from the local not-for-profit organisation RV.One kindly helped build a sturdy new shed in the apple orchard at Mill Water SEN School this week.

This was a great example of a community partnership, with mutual benefits for the RV.One helpers and Mill Water. The school, next to Bicton College, educates 115 pupils with profound and complex learning disabilities. It strives to promote inclusivity, to help pupils to develop skills for independent living and to enable them to successfully integrate in their communities. The much-needed shed will store tools for gardening projects and it frees up an area adjacent to the school's new bike track, creating the storage needed for new specialist bike equipment. Pupils from Classes 12 and 13 went along to inspect the new shed being built and to chat with the volunteers.

The organisation, named after the rendezvous first checkpoint term used in the military, was founded by a local Royal Marine and aims to support mental wellbeing through outdoor and social activities.

Team leader and former Royal Marine Luke Kelsall, who talked openly about his own past mental health struggles, said: "It was great to be a part of this project. This was an opportunity for volunteers to do something active and creative, with a tangible outcome and a real end product; and it was a good example of a community coming together to help one another. Thank you to Mill Water School for being so welcoming."

Mill Water School headteacher Sarah Pickering said: "It was a pleasure to meet the volunteers and we are grateful to them as the storage was a necessity. It is, however, particularly nice to hear they got something out of the project too. I look forward to welcoming them again." RV.One's mission statement is 'Rehabilitating the mind through functional fitness, creativity and adventure'. It was launched with a commando-style beach challenge in Exmouth just before the Covid pandemic and it provides support to anyone struggling with mental health.
