February view from the Vicarage ...

February has the reputation of being a dark dismal unremitting month so it might seem appropriate that Ash Wednesday falls on the 22nd when we recall our mortality and at the Ash Wednesday service, I apply Ash to people's foreheads (if desired) accompanied by the words

"From dust you came and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ."

Thus, with this reminder of our own mortality ringing in our ears we enter the season of Lent where we strive to come into a better relationship with God and with our neighbour.

Traditionally this season is coloured by the notion of sacrifice and people usually have "given things up for Lent" but in recent years I've noticed a trend for "taking things on for Lent" because there are many ways in which we can establish a better relationship with God and taking something up (for example) of something simple like saying a prayer before meals, or reading some spiritual literature every day, or thanking people more than you would normally, has the benefit that it generally makes you feel good as well.

Of course, the Lenten tradition of sacrifice and self-examination leads up to the great celebration of Easter and it as a fact of life that you enjoy the highs much more after you have experienced the lows, which is why both great explosions of celebration and rejoicing in the Christian calendar of Christmas and Easter are both preceded by more sombre periods of reflection. Both Lent (before Easter) and Advent (before Christmas) lead us into a state of being that enables us to enjoy and appreciate more the heightened state of joy and celebration of both festivals. This makes sense on a human level because it is hard work trying to maintain a heightened level of enjoyment over a long period of time which has the effect of deadening the day of celebration itself.

For example, extending Christmas over a longer and longer time just ends up making the actual day itself a relief just to get the whole thing over with. I recommend a bit of what they nowadays call "delayed gratification". Lent fulfils that role before Easter wonderfully.

and uplifting concert for the Friends of All Saints. Over 100 people attended, welcomed on that chilly night with a glass of mulled wine. The church was a 'warm place' and a good time was had by all. Most wonderfully, the audience helped us to raise over £1000 towards the upkeep of the church and added another £300 towards the fundraising of the selffunded choir themselves! It was a win/win



situation, sadly unlike the event at the same time in Qatar where England footballers lost out in their quest to win the World Cup.

Following the difficult 'lockdown' years when we could not hold any events, 2022 has shown a huge reversal. This is an amazing figure and will hopefully help fund one or two of the more major bits of remedial work required to keep the church building well-maintained.

To start 2023, on 20th January there were only 8 of us - many people were away and some unwell but we still managed to complete the e ssential works.

Magnificent Yews (part 1)



Whilst churchyards contain many different veteran trees, it is the yews that are particularly special. Globally, veteran and ancient yews are threatened; however, on a world stage the best refuge for these trees is actually the churchyards of England and Wales. It is in these enclosed spaces that over three quarters of Britain's oldest yew trees can be found. Some trees are believed to be several thousand years old. Yew specialists and enthusiasts from all over the world travel to

these special sites to marvel at our magnificent yews – many of which have been growing for over 1000 years.

Our Churchyards...

In our Churchyards, having measured the girths, we think that our yews do not yet qualify as "Veterans" yet ... the six trees are possibly between 250 and 460 years old. The ones near the Tower and the Porch are probably the oldest.

The yew trees we are referring to are the long lived Taxus baccata (often referred to as the Common, English or European Yew) as opposed to others also found in churchyards such as the Irish Yew which is more upright, neat in shape and not nearly as long lived.

Almost every part of the yew is poisonous to stock and wildlife (including humans!). But birds such as blackbirds, waxwings, thrushes, and fieldfares enjoy the fleshy red berries. If you are partial to gathering fungi to eat, it is best to avoid even edible species if you find them growing on a yew tree.

The Common yews tend to grow in a 'normal' tree shape until about 600 years old when they often hollow out and thicken around the base. This hollow cylindrical structure does not weaken the tree, in fact it may even strengthen its structure. Hollow yews are great for sheltering wildlife and in past centuries were even used as homes by monks in Wales and Ireland.

So why is it that churchyards have become the sanctuary for these magnificent trees in a global context? Well, the jury is still out on this, but a few factors may have contributed ... see part 2 in next month's Parish News.

Do visit and enjoy the Churchyards – wonderfully welcoming, peaceful places for quiet contemplation and mindfulness and a haven for wildlife.

RSPB Aylesbeare Common

 $D^{ecember \ brought \ with \ it \ colder}_{temperatures \ and \ although \ the}$ colourful leaves of Autumn had largely left the reserve, the frosts provided some wonderful views across the landscape. Not to be perturbed by the cold snap, our volunteers continued with the programme of winter scrub management. Focusing on the Harpford side of the reserve, several areas have changed dramatically. On the main track from Hunger Hill to Outerhanger, two areas of tall gorse have been removed. A mixture of tall gorse and birch encroaching onto the Heath were also removed up the hill from Outerhanger. The steep slope down towards the stream has been opened up through gorse removal and provides a great view across to the Aylesbeare side of the common. A further site by the track to Benchams gate, which had been taken over by birch growth, has also been tackled. These actions will allow gorse and heather regrowth, providing better habitats for our target species (such as the Dartford Warbler). Thanks to Bicton College Countryside Management students, who joined us for a couple of days of scrub management, we covered a larger area than we would otherwise have managed.

We have continued to move our grazing ponies back to Aylesbeare from other reserves. Four Exmoor ponies from Manor Common (the first to graze there since 2018) have joined those already on Aylesbeare, bringing the total to 17 including the Dartmoors. A further four Dartmoor ponies on Venn Ottery Common will soon join the Aylesbeare set. Moving the ponies around provides us with the opportunity to carry out other tasks to ensure the health of the ponies such as worming and checking the condition of their hooves.

Prior to the Christmas break we had our Christmas work party at Venn Ottery Hill. This site is an ex-quarry which has recently been awarded at the Sustainable Development Awards in the category of Restoration. Volunteers descended on an area where birch had encroached on the heathland and spent the morning felling trees and trimming back brambles. Lunch of Vegan Ragu was cooked by one of the volunteers over a firepit which we all crowded around and discussed plans for the holiday season. After lunch we returned to work, though possibly with slightly less gusto after such a hearty meal!

Winter also involved a change to our bird survey activities with monthly Hen Harrier roost watches and winter bird transects (where a defined route is walked and birds are identified by sight or sound). The transects offer a great chance to see some heathland specialists including Dartford Warblers and Snipe and for the volunteers to improve our bird identification skills.

Pupils at Mill Water School in East Budleigh were amazed to receive a card from King Charles in the post!

They had written to him last term to extend their condolences after the Queen's death. His reply included a beautiful childhood photo of himself and his mother and the following heartfelt words:

"It was so very kind of you to send me such a wonderfully generous message following the death of my beloved mother. Your most thoughtful words were enormously comforting, and I cannot tell you how deeply they are appreciated at this time of immense sorrow."

Class teacher Gemma said: "Pupils were deeply saddened by news of the Queen's death last year. After discussions, we decided that sending a card would be a good idea. They were so excited when they got a reply and wanted to show everyone. They knew it was from the King as they spotted the special stamp on the envelope."

Mill Water is a special needs school educating 121 pupils, aged 3 to ¬19, with severe and complex learning difficulties. The East Budleigh History (EBHG)

Living memories

I was able to talk to Beatrice in the family home in Yettinton, where she has lived for just over 50 years. She and her husband moved there, in what was a 'New Build', in 1972.

Beatrice Agnes Louisa Coulthard was born in Budleigh Salterton and moved to East Budleigh three weeks later. The family lived in a cottage opposite the Church now known as number 42 High Street. In those days none of the cottages were numbered. Beatrice tells me that number 42 is very different now from what it was when she lived there. She remembers leaving her window open one morning, to arrive home to find that Mrs Hart's bus had demolished it! Parents were none too pleased!

Living in East Budleigh was wonderful ; Beatrice took part in the East Budleigh Players who would put on the annual three night show/play. The village had a 'Silver Band'. Beatrice remembers the V.E. Day street party and the celebrations at the end of the Second World War. Shops closed one afternoon a week and on a Sunday. However, Beatrice remembers the one Sunday when Mr Annis briefly opened his shop; if you brought a saucer and tuppence you could have a small ice cream, a rare treat in those days.

Rationing was not a problem as you would place your orders with specific shops. 'Webbers Butchers' in Budleigh Salterton delivered meat twice a week and Mr Pickett would deliver fish from Exmouth. Beatrice also remembers Jack Harris from Knowle walking the streets with a flattish barrow and calling out "herrings, herrings". In those days there were a lot of shops in the village; Mr Hill and Mr Letten repaired shoes, there was a Co-op, a Bakery where Beatrice worked at some point, a newsagent and Mrs Pullin ran the village stores, which sold everything including paraffin! The stores were later taken over by Mr Keys. However, Beatrice still remembers the smell of paraffin which permeated the shop when Mrs Pullin was there!

Beatrice remembers Herbert Jennings' workshop opposite Drakes School , later used by son Maurice, and that Herbert operated the Devon Princess Paddle Steamer in Exmouth. A courtyard house, known as 'The Bower', now stands on the site.

Dick Pidgeon would regularly take his herd of cows through the village from the fields above 'The Pound', all the way through the village and beyond All Saints Church, then along a narrow footpath called 'Vineyard Lane', which led to the allotments and fields beyond. You can see this scene on one of the old village postcards.

Beatrice attended the village school until the age of 11 then moved on to St Peter's, Budleigh Salterton, where she completed her secondary education. An old bus/donkey cart would take the children to school in Budleigh. Since then, Beatrice has attended two reunions at Drake's School, in 1993 and in 2002. On leaving school at Easter when nearly 15 she started a job as a cashier in the 'World Stores' Budleigh Salterton. She later worked in East Budleigh village bakery, which was very close to home, then later moved to work in Exmouth.

In 1956 Beatrice married Brian Fowler from Sidmouth in All Saints Church. The couple had three children, Alan, Andrew and Christine. Brian was a postman, previously a carpenter by trade and the couple moved to Stroud, Gloucestershire for eight years where Brian continued working as a postman. On returning to East Budleigh, they lived in the village post office, where Beatrice was the Post Mistress whilst Brian worked on the post in Budleigh Salterton.

Beatrice now lives quietly in the family home in Yettington, next door to daughter Christine. She is a regular attender at All Saints Church which she says is also her home, having been christened, confirmed and married there.

The East Budleigh History (EBHG)

E ast Budleigh History (EBHG) met on Tuesday 13 December 2022 at Temple Hill House. The group aims to make local history accessible to all people in East Budleigh. To provide a brief history of Temple Hill, MM read an extract from Raleigh's Birthplace, The Story of East Budleigh by Lilian Sheppard. In summary, the Nunnery of Polslo in Exeter was granted the Manor of Budley Polslo at the end of the reign of Henry II, just before his death in 1189. This was confirmed in a Charter by his son John when he later acceded to the throne. Budley Polslo was an ecclesiastical manor comprising all the village and High Street above the bridge, Hayes Lane, 150 acres of Hayes Wood and a significant part of common land, in total 881 acres.

The Manor House or Priory was located close to the church from where the Prioress and nuns ran the day to day affairs of Budley Polslo. Whilst there is no record, it has always been thought that the nuns' priory was located where Temple Hill is today. The mill was located in the field below and the Polslo corn was ground there. The mill continued in operation up to the late 19th century.

With the dissolution of the Monasteries by Henry VIII in 1539, the nuns were pensioned off and the Manor of Polslo sold to the St. Clere family of Tidwell. After some years, it was sold to Thomas Forde, whose mother was a St. Clere. It is understood that the Fordes lived in the old Priory. Thomas Forde's wife was the daughter of Sir John Popham, The Lord Chief Justice, who bought the place from his son-in-law. It was Sir John Popham who was the presiding Judge at the trial of Sir Walter Raleigh in 1603.

The Court of Polslo continued until 1884 to settle important matters for the estate tenants. The Duke family subsequently became the owners of the Polslo Manor, and for 200 years supported the vicars in the church living.

The Polslo Manor estate was purchased by the Rolles in 1785 and eventually became part of Clinton Devon Estates. MM understands that Temple Hill House was extended by Lady Louisa Rolle in about 1840. The 12 acres of Temple Hill was sold by Clinton Devon Estates in 1981 and subsequently divided into the separate House and Coach House in 1997, the 4-acre orchard having been sold for the development of today's Priory Close. With the purchase of Temple Hill House in 1999, the current owner is only the 10th 'owner' of Temple Hill in 1,000 years!

Budleigh Salterton Lions Club

Budleigh Salterton Lions Club has been collecting used spectacles that are no longer required. The spectacles are recycled and used to improve the eyesight of children and adults in other countries.

Lion Willi Rehbock has been responsible for gathering and storing the spectacles for a number of years and had until recently amassed over 1500 pairs of glasses! Lions Clubs all over the UK send the spectacles to one of two recycling centres in Chichester or Birmingham for sorting.





On a recent visit to Lions National HQ in Kings Heath in Birmingham, Budleigh Lions President Richard Allen had great pleasure in delivering a number of boxes containing the 1500 spectacles to the Lions 'Recycle for Sight' volunteers.

The dedicated team of volunteers sort and process thousands of pairs of spectacles each week! None of the spectacles are sent to landfill, all of them are re-used and given a second life.

The Lions then send the glasses to Lions Medico France for washing and re-grading and also send them directly to countries throughout the world.

Using a focimeter, the power of the lenses is measured, the references of which are automatically entered on a sheet. The latter is attached to the glasses placed in a plastic bag, all ready for shipment to a country in Africa, Asia, South America... and Europe, to restore sight to visually impaired people.

Richard said " Vision is one of the Lions' five global causes. It's wonderful to be a small part of the process of recycling unwanted spectacles to provide sight to visually impaired people around the world. We are also helping the environment by preventing boxes and boxes of used glasses ending up in landfill. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Lion Willi and everyone who has supported us by donating their unwanted spectacles. Small acts of kindness really can make a difference."

Used spectacles can be dropped off at any of the Lions events such as their monthly Bingo, or at Bennett & Rogers opticians in Budleigh. All types of spectacles can be recycled including reading glasses and children's spectacles are always much needed.

Budleigh Salterton Lions Club Diabetes Awareness



Diabetes Awareness is one of five Global Causes supported by Lions International. Budleigh Salterton Lions are keen to promote awareness as 4.9 million people have been diagnosed with diabetes in the UK. It is estimated that 850,000 people may have the disease but have not been diagnosed. So it is important to know the symptoms and know the risk as Type 2 diabetes is preventable.

Symptoms. The four T's: Toilet, Thirst, Tiredness and Thinness. If you are weeing a lot, have excessive thirst, are very tired, and losing weight for no reason then seek advice.

The risk increases with age, you are more at risk if you're white and over 40 or black and over 25. it increases with Ethnicity and with family history, the risk is more likely if your parents or siblings have diabetes. Finally you are more at risk if you suffer from high blood pressure or if you are overweight.For more information go to www.diabetes.org.uk/knowyourrisk.

There is support via weight loss programmes, advice from a registered dietitian, exercise through specialists or classes, and through Type 2 diabetes prevention programmes. Type 1 Diabetes affects about 10% of people with diabetes and is a result of the pancreas being unable to produce insulin.

Diabetes is a serious disease and if not diagnosed and not treated, the complications can be severe including blindness, kidney failure, amputations, nerve damage and heart failure.
