## Sunday 17th October – 20 after Trinity – Proper 24

I am presiding at both services at St. Peter's and Reverend Margaret Scrivener is presiding at All Saints (where there is also a baptism) and Reverend Chris Cant is presiding at St. Michael's.

**Isaiah 53: 4-12.** This final and sublime of the "servant songs" and its rich poetic language has always exerted a powerful pull on the imagination. Christians believe that the suffering servant finds its ultimate embodiment in Jesus. The power of vicarious suffering, achieving forgiveness of sins and bestowing righteousness "for and on our behalf" finds its final vindication in the resurrection of Jesus.

**Hebrews 5: 1-10.** A high priest once and for all time "according to the order of Melchizedek" is how the author of Hebrews describes the priesthood of Jesus. He is far beyond a servant however and is called God's Son. It is by allowing Jesus into our hearts by his Spirit that we have direct access to the Father through sharing in his priesthood. St. Paul described this state as living "in Christ".

**Mark 10: 35-45.** Jesus describes his own ministry as being a servant of humanity, freeing us from slavery to sin and death and freeing us to have righteousness "reckoned to us" and having eternal life. Likewise, we are to be servants of the people and not to lord it over them. An antidote not only to an overt clericalism but all Christian notions of pride or specialness. All humans are in the same boat. As has often been said, sharing the gospel is like one beggar telling another beggar where to find bread.

Further to Louise winning a research grant for Exeter University, we have been asked to arrange a night at St. Peter's church to bring together university researchers and the Christian community. We will invite churches to partake from all the local deaneries of course. I will introduce and provide the prayers and Louise will be one of the speakers at this University outreach initiative. This evening will take place on February 9th next year, so a date for your diary.

Later today I will be attending a presentation ceremony at St. Peter's burial ground to receive the runners up prize as the best churchyard in Devon from the Campaign for the preservation of rural England (CPRE). I am used to the churchyard at All Saints East Budleigh receiving accolades like this, but in the case of St. Peter's burial ground I didn't even know that we had entered the competition!

When I received the phone call from the CPRE they wanted it all kept quiet so they could manage the publicity so I'm just jumping the gun by a few hours today. This all stems from Brian Shackleton's efforts to re-wild the churchyard, a project he trailed in church a couple of years ago if you remember. Brian is a bit poorly nowadays and the organising of the burial ground has passed to Melena MacClellan alongside the tending and digging and landscaping of Larry Sampson. As well as all our churches, our churchyards are a significant feature of our local communities and I know that St. Peter's school take the children there for nature and wildlife classes.

I was listening on the radio this morning to another of the "doom and gloom" features which form such a staple of our broadcasting media nowadays that lamented the fact that Britain is last in the G7 countries for its lack of biodiversity. We can be proud of the fact that our churchyards in the RMC are doing our bit to reverse that decline and conserve our natural habitats. If you are used to just walking through them without noticing or haven't visited before because the burial ground is detached from the church in the case of St. Peter's, try and make some time to take a look and have a few minutes of contemplation in any one of them. It will do your soul good.
