Dear Friends,

"The sun is out, the sky is blue, there's not a cloud to spoil the view, but it's raining, raining in my heart" was a great song by Buddy Holly about a broken heart, but it speaks a great truth that while everything might be fine on the surface of our lives, we can each of us be carrying great burdens that weigh us down making us very unhappy indeed.

I am not thinking of clinical depression, for which there may be a chemical imbalance, and for which I am not qualified to comment upon, but rather the daily hurts, bereavements, abandonments, slights, failures and unkindness borne by all of us at some point. You never know what is or has been going on in people's lives that may be causing them great sadness and affecting the way they speak and relate to other people.

And if I can mention another classic – the tracks of my tears by Smokey Robinson – we are mostly very adept at covering up the truth and giving off the impression that everything in the garden is lovely. Being honest to someone about how you really feel can be cathartic, but most people find it very embarrassing, so here's a thought.. Try taking those things, situations and predicaments to God. There is a saying that goes "You are never alone with Christ". Pouring out your heart to God is equally cathartic and Christians believe it will not be in vain. When people pray, things happen, sometimes surprising and unexpected things. You may even find that the load on your heart starts to lighten somewhat. If you have really "prayed in anger" before and don't know where to start, here is something to get you going. It is **the serenity prayer.** 

God, grant me the Serenity to accept the things I cannot change... Courage to change the things I can, and Wisdom to know the difference. Living one day at a time, enjoying one moment at a time, Accepting hardship as the pathway to peace. Taking, as He did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it. Trusting that He will make all things right if I surrender to His will.

That I may be reasonably happy in this life, and supremely happy with Him forever in the next.

#### **Report from Exmouth Food Bank**



In March food parcels were given to 264 families and individuals and fed 492 people. This is almost a 10% rise in demand since last month. This is not surprising, as many people are struggling to pay bills and put food on the table. The Food Bank is here to help and will continue to provide food, guidance and support. In Budleigh, the Co-op, Tesco and Spar all have collection points which are emptied each week by a member of our congregation and the gifts taken to the Food Bank. *Sue Low*

#### **News from St Peter's School**

The children and staff at St Peter's have been working hard to reduce our impact on the planet by reducing, reusing, and recycling. We are lucky to have been accepted onto Devon County Council's WoW (War on Waste) project and all classes are taking part in workshops on topics such as composting and recycling. As part of the WoW project, a Waste Education Officer is working with our Eco Champions to carry out an audit of our school's waste and identify ways to reduce it.

Some of the actions that we have taken include: collecting our food waste for anaerobic ingestion; ensuring that everyone knows which recycling bins to use; switching to refillable cleaning products; reducing the single-use packaging in our school kitchen and sharing information with families about how to pack a low waste lunch; using reusable cloths in classes and encouraging children to use just one paper towel to dry their hands; holding swaps and sales of preloved items such as toys, books, and clothing. We also have 'Terracycle' collections for waste, such as pens and make-up packaging which can't be recycled within our normal collections.

For those who enjoy the light-hearted side of church life: (from actual church bulletins – I think not ours...)

'At the evening service tonight, the sermon topic will be 'What is Hell?' Come early and listen to our choir practice.'


#### **Rendezvous**

The Friday morning "Rendezvous" held at the Peter Hall was the idea of our local vicar at the time, Canon Ken Parry – about 30 years ago. It was in order to get the townspeople together after their shopping since there was only one bus a week on Fridays. It has been running successfully all this time in spite of regular daily bus services and more cars! Unfortunately, it had to cease during times of "lockdown" for Covid but has been resumed since October 2021. It is a very friendly gathering in the Peter Hall from about 9.45 to 11.30 and provides filter and decaf coffee, breakfast tea (and decaf) as well as Earl Grey, fruit and peppermint teas and chocolate. After expenses, any money remaining goes to good causes. When we closed in March 2020 we were able to send £250 to to the Community Larder. Please consider joining us from time to time!

#### **Open the Book**

A few years ago the Bible Society created a project entitled "Open the Book". Its aim was to encourage churches to set



up small groups to act Bible Stories in school assemblies. It is a three year plan which covers key stories from the Old and New Testament of the Bible.

> A group was set up in the Raleigh Mission Community which also included members of other churches. This group was large enough to split into two and once a fortnight either one group or the other visited Otterton, East Budleigh, and St Peter's Schools. The children loved their visits, particularly when they were able to take part. Unfortunately, during the Covid pandemic we could not continue with these visits,

however during March we returned to carry out a couple of visits to the Otterton and Drakes, East Budleigh schools. The first story we produced was about how God created the world and the second about how Adan and Eve disobeyed God, misled by an evil snake, and were banned from the beautiful garden. We had some marvellous props and the team gave a most convincing performance. The children loved it and concluded our worship with some wonderful singing.
