Dear Friends,

I clicked on my on-line diary to see what was in store for August to get a little inspiration, when the first thing that caught my eye was my mum's birthday and then at the bottom of the page my dad's birthday. Both of them have died within the last three years and I realised that I hadn't really thought about them for a little while.

Having my memory jogged quite forcibly of course I then couldn't stop thinking about them – their lives, their marriage, my childhood, their hopes and dreams and I became quite emotional. As a Christian of course I believe in life eternal, so nothing that was spiritually good in their lives was wasted, but also in a very physical way, in the lives of me and my brother and sister, they are living on through us.

It is only as you get older that you start to ponder and appreciate what went before you, what made you the person you are and times and places in our family histories take on a special, more significant role in our lives. Reminiscences of past times, occasions, weddings, funerals, baptisms, family parties at Christmas pass fleetingly in front of your eyes and you realise more fully what they mean to you.

I suppose that is why subconsciously I have always tried to give one hundred per cent to every big family occasion that I get assigned to do. They are not my family of course, but in every celebration or funeral I realise that I have privileged access to a family occasion that will be remembered and probably enter that family's memory banks for ever, and one day that ten-year-old usher will be an old man who'll also find himself looking back and half remembering the scene from his youth.

All things pass of course, and as an active memory it will slowly dim as the generations progress and will be mostly forgotten. Forgotten by us of course, but I have a belief in God for whom there is an eternal present, and nothing is ever wasted or lost and all that was wrong or painful is healed and put right.

People in our church: Chris Parrish

Chris was born in Leeds in 1931, but fairly soon moved with the family to Bournemouth, where his parents ran a hotel. In 1939 he was sent to Sherborne Preparatory School, taking with him whooping cough and measles. He passed these onto many other boys (not a popular move in a new school) and spent six weeks of that first term at home. This was followed by a move to Clifton College, Bristol, then evacuated temporarily to Bude. After some time at the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst, he was commissioned into the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers in 1950.

Subsequently there was an Engineering Degree at Fitzwilliam House (now College) in Cambridge, a graduate apprenticeship at Rolls Royce, Crewe, three postings to Germany, a move to Christmas Island to observe nuclear testing, a brief spell as the Adjutant in a REME Training Battalion before a move to Welbeck College as the first regular officer on the staff there. Then followed a three year posting to The War Office, a loan job to the Jamaica Defence Force, a job in a Defence Quality Assurance Directorate, to Headquarters Northern Ireland, command of a TA unit in the North East, before a final job in Headquarters Eastern District in Colchester. At some point he spent a year unaccompanied in Brunei! Somewhere in all this he found time to meet and marry Janet Robbins, occupy and move from 22 different houses, with much help from her and a little from him to produce Andrew in 1962, Mark in 1964 and Sarah in 1968. Also to leave the Army after 36 years service, find a civilian job with a firm of Consulting Engineers for a further 13 years. The firm was called Dale and Goldfinger and yes it does have something to do with James Bond and Ian Fleming, but that is another story!

Later on there were four grandchildren to help with. Oliver and Finn, Lauren and Lizzie. Janet helped Chris to learn to sing. So a few years as the Chairman of the Swindon Choral Society, membership of the Exeter University Choral Society, Chairman of the Exeter Bach Society, membership of our Church Choir, helped him to fill his time.

There was editorship of the St Peter' Church Magazine for many years, bringing the Church history up to date, looking after the Sidespersons at St Peter's before being elected Churchwarden in 2019. He was the Chairman of the local group of, using the current name, Cancer Research UK. The first local Cancer Big Breakfast actually took place in his present house in Exmouth Road! Because of the size of the garden there and Janet's total skill with gardening and flower growing, his house is still usually a riot of colour. Not too many moments to draw the occasional breath! Even today!

Thank you, Chris, for giving us such an interesting account of your life so far!
