Dear Friends,

It's amazing what you learn looking at Google. Fun fact: Apparently July was named July in 44BC by the Roman senate (what have the Romans ever done for us?) in honour of Julius Caesar. Before that it was known as Quintillis because it was the fifth month of the year which only started in March. Winter was

deemed to have no months! Mind boggling.

A report from the Head Teacher indicated some serious problems at St. Peters School over Covid related absences, staffing difficulties and severe financial problems.Christine Channon is retiring as our Reader due to a diocese-imposed age limit. Jo Bowen volunteered to act as Chair of the flower arrangers for a trial period.

APCM: 21st May. Chris Parrish has retired as Church Warden after many years sterling service. John Rockey was elected to serve as Warden in his place, with Iris Cooper. The Electoral roll is down 2 at 144, due to deaths and moves away. The Vicar was on holiday in Spain. Widespread disappointment was expressed at his absence from this most important meeting. According to Freeman we need to recover a one storey vision of the universe, we need to see that God is everywhere and we should expect to see him all the time.
