Dear Friends,

Pastoral Care in the Raleigh Mission Community

At the present time we have 14 members in our Pastoral Care Team. We meet bi-monthly in the Peter Hall, usually on a Monday afternoon. We have a visiting list of people who are known to us, the majority being housebound. The number of people on our list fluctuates throughout the year. We try to make sure that Communion is offered to the nursing homes on a monthly basis and I am very grateful to those who so ably and willingly provide this. The Chaplaincy team at the RD&E are very quick to respond whenever asked to visit any of our parishioners who have become a patient at the hospital. Our aim as a team is to ensure that all those unable to come to church know they are not forgotten. We each have one or two people we try to visit at least once a month, but sometimes hearing a friendly voice over the phone can make a difference to someone's day. The purpose of meeting together is to support one another and is an opportunity to catch up on everyone's welfare.

The PCC Budget

The PCC has approved a budget for the year 2024 which would result in a financial loss for St Peter's of £26,335. This would substantially eat further into our diminishing reserves. Planned Giving is included in the budget at 2023 levels. The Diocesan parish contribution in the budget of £94,609 is in line with the figure quoted by the Diocesa. The Diocesan contribution which pays for the training, salaries, pensions and housing of clergy makes up about 47% of the whole of our costs for a year. The charge is based on the number of adults who regularly attend our church services (Participants).

Although efforts will be made to restrict costs and increase fundraising the church is very heavily dependent on Planned Giving from the congregation which has reduced in recent years. During 2024 the regular congregation will be asked to review their level of giving in order to avoid the budgeted level of losses and to help to return our church's finances to a sustainable level. The £26,355 deficit would be eliminated if each Participant increased their giving by £2.50 per week plus gift aid (£5 per couple).

Jean, pictured here in her beloved Tanzania, has returned to her Devon roots, having been born in Exeter, but she moved with her family to Merton in south west London at the age of seven. She trained to be a teacher in Canterbury, specialising in PE for 9-13 year olds. Her first job was in a school in Essex, and during her time there, she had a strong sense of being called to full time Christian ministry.

She spent two years at Trinity Theological College in Bristol, was ordained deacon in 1991 and was then one of the first women to be ordained priest in April 1994. She worked as a curate in Coventry, an assistant priest in Bishops Stortford and vicar in three rural villages in North Bedfordshire. At this time she was also the URC Minister for a year alongside being the Anglican Minister – being heavily involved in the Local Ecumenical Project. Jean was blessed with a very positive outlook, as in each of these places she found good things going on in the churches, and good friends too!

Later she moved back to the Canterbury area to be vicar of three villages, and again had a good experience, but she decided to retire in 2021. She had always dreamed of living by the sea. One sister lives near Honiton, so Jean decided to investigate the sea within reach of Honiton. She describes parking in Budleigh, walking down to the beach, and promptly falling in love with Budleigh! A priest who retires must not officiate for six months, and after that period Jean obtained her PtO (Permission to Officiate) from the diocese. Jean has a lot of Churches Together experience and is keen to develop links with other local churches. This has begun through Open the Book and the Prayer Vigils for Israel and Palestine.

Jean made her first visit to Tanzania during a sabbatical, organised by CMS. Since then she has been back four more times, and hopes to go again next year. Her feelings about Tanzania and Africa can be summed up in the quote: 'A returning short-term missionary said he didn't know if he was returning home or leaving home . . . it is like having a foot in two worlds and longing for one while being physically present in the other.' (Francine Marie Thomas, The Road to Kondoa)

Jean says her best holiday, apart from Tanzania and Zanzibar, was a trip down the Nile. She is a volunteer at the Information Centre and is interested in all kinds of 'crafty' things; in her sitting room there is a beautiful cross stitch picture of an angel, made by Jean, and she is learning to do both wet and dry felting.

With all her skills and experience in Christian ministry amongst adults and children, we are indeed blessed that Jean chose Budleigh! *Editor Lizzy*
