Christmas Eve and Christmas day readings

Quite complicated because there are three sets of permissible readings for Christmas. I will be using "set 3" for both the midnight Mass service (11pm) at St. Peter's on Christmas Eve and the 11am Christmas day service at St. Michael's Otterton. Reverend Trevor Jones has chosen "set 1" at All Saints East Budleigh which are Isaiah 9:2-7, Titus 2:2-7 and Luke 2: 1-14 (15-20). Rev. Karen Young will preside at the 8am and 11am at St. Peter's and will choose either set 1,2 or 3 for them. I provide a reflection on the set 3 readings here.

Isaiah 52: 7-10. A messenger appears on the horizon bringing good news to a broken and besieged city that salvation is on its way. When the watchman realise it is good news they spread the message amongst the people of Jerusalem and eventually they all sing for joy. Emmanuel "God is with us" is the message of Christmas, and our role is to react with joy and spread that message until the whole world is singing with joy

Hebrews 1: 1-4. Whilst the humanity of Jesus is the subject of chapter two of Hebrews the letter starts by stressing the divinity of Jesus much like John's prologue which follows. The wisdom of God is manifested in Jesus "the reflection of God's glory, the exact imprint of God's very being". This manifestation of God's presence and glory in the world is what we call "the Christ"

John 1: 1-14. The Christ was not a bolt from the blue but was "with God in the beginning" a revelation of eternal truth. The universal Christ made human in Jesus, is the presence of God himself who stands at both the beginning and the end of all history – but was made tangible at a certain point in historical time – making clear and apparent the will and purposes of God to human beings. God is Love and Grace and Truth and He wills the healing and salvation of all creation. Quite a message! And we are charged with living out and spreading that message.

The set psalm of the day is psalm 98. A psalm of

joy and rejoicing

O sing to the Lord a new song, for he has done marvellous things. His right hand and his holy arm have gotten him victory. ² The Lord has made known his victory; he has revealed his vindication in the sight of the nations. ³ He has remembered his steadfast love and faithfulness to the house of Israel. All the ends of the earth have seen the victory of our God. ⁴ Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth into joyous song and sing praises. ⁵ Sing praises to the Lord with the lyre, with the lyre and the sound of melody. ⁶ With trumpets and the sound of the horn make a joyful noise before the King, the Lord. ⁷ Let the sea roar, and all that fills it; the world and those who live in it. ⁸ Let the floods clap their hands; let the hills sing together for joy ⁹ at the presence of the Lord, for he is coming to judge the earth. He will judge the world with righteousness, and the peoples with equity.

Thought for the day

Can you remember Christmas as a child? Of course you can – the anticipation, the excitement, getting up and creeping downstairs to see your presents when you thought everyone was asleep. When I was young Christmas was all about the presents first and foremost, then the traditions

like hanging your stockings up (come to think about it – that's presents again isn't it?), Turkey dinners, crackers, Christmas trees and decorations, too much chocolate, and everyone making a conscious effort to be nice and friendly (it can't hurt once a year can it?) I'm sure there are thoughtful, reflective, spiritual children out there but I wasn't one of them and neither were any of my friends. The "story" I spend my life trying to preach nowadays didn't really impinge on me at all. It was purely a dimly perceived backdrop to the festivities. So, I'm in no place to judge anyone who doesn't respond to the story or worry that youngsters don't appear to care one way or another because once upon a time neither did I. Your perspectives change as you mature (for most of us anyway) and your spiritual side develops slowly, moulded by life events in the main. What that story *means* is the 64,000dollar guestion and that also takes time to unfold and changes over time as certainties unravel and re-form in different ways in that classic "order-disorder - reorder" schema I wrote about recently. For me, the incarnation used to be a feature of the Christian story that I knew about but didn't care much about, but late in my theological development it is now fundamental to my belief system and essential to understanding the coherence and nature of the sacraments not as supernatural things but as entirely natural. In short, creation was the first "incarnation" or "sacrament" and Jesus fulfils and reveals that truth in what we now generally refer to as the incarnation. God is transcendent but God is also imminent in all things. As Jesus says when he became a man many years later in Luke 17.

²⁰ Once Jesus^[3] was asked by the Pharisees when the kingdom of God was coming, and he answered, "The kingdom of God is not coming with things that can be observed; ²¹ nor will they say, 'Look, here it is!' or 'There it is!' For, in fact, the kingdom of God is within you."

Remember that whether you are spending Christmas alone or with family and friends this year – the Kingdom of God is WITHIN YOU so you are never alone.
