
## Dear friends,

## Sunday 28th August – Trinity 11 – Proper 17

I will be presiding at both services at St. Peter's and Reverend Margaret Scrivener will be presiding at All Saints and St. Michael's at 9.30am and 11am respectively.

**Ecclesiasticus 10: 12-18.** This book of the Bible is located in protestant Bibles in what is called the apocrypha (and only some protestant Bibles have the apocrypha!) and is also known as the wisdom of Jesus Ben Sirach. As a compliment to the gospel reading, it is saying that all sovereignty belongs to God and failure to recognise this and when we start to feel pride in our own status, decisions and autonomy, this leads to disaster.

**Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16.** Entertaining angels unawares is a lovely phrase that assumes that God works through other people to reach out speak to us and is also reminiscent of the three visitors to Abraham in Genesis. I always also extend my understanding of people in prison and being tortured to people who are in a mental prison and psychologically tortured as well as literally in prison. Loyalty and fidelity in marriage is a reflection of the loyalty and fidelity that we must show to God

**Luke 14: 1, 7-14.** Having an inflated estimation of yourself – pride – is warned against here by Jesus who praises the gift of humility and having a more sober assessment of yourself when choosing your place at table. But the shared meal is also a picture of the kingdom of heaven at the end of time so has a wider spiritual application. At the end Jesus advises inviting the poor, lame and blind to the banquet, people outside the social milieu of the

pharisees and actually considered unclean in Jewish religion. All are welcome at the banquet where the host is God himself and we all have and show a proper humility towards God.

## Thought for Today

I am so looking forward to Venice. It appears so romantic and ethereal and filled with canals and alleyways to get lost in, good food, crammed with churches and art and music. They do say that a change is as good as a rest, and this is a change that seems pregnant with possibilities. Enhancing our cultural capital has become a bit of a mission lately but you don't need to go to Venice to do that. Widening our horizons by engaging in literature, art, music and theatre are avenues open to all and sundry if it becomes anyone to prioritise these things that shape us to become a more fully rounded and interesting human being. "Fullness of life" which is God's desire for every one of us has its obvious spiritual dimension but also a practical "lived experience" dimension. I read something very helpful to me the other day and was this - "The chasm between the physical and the spiritual is not greater than between a thought and a word and it is hard to know where one ends and another begins". This speaks into the truth that physical things have spiritual benefits (and is indeed the underlying philosophy behand Yoga) and who amongst us hasn't been lifted spiritually by a stirring piece of music or piece of art or sculpture or indeed....by a gorgeous city astride a grand canal dripping with romance, history and art.
