Dear friends,

The Epiphany season reaches its climax <u>next Sunday</u> with the feast of the presentation of Christ in the Temple, a day also known as "the purification of Mary" or more colloquially as "Candlemas" because in days of yore churches used to bless all the candles they were going to use that year on this day.

Then follows a few weeks of ordinary time before Ash Wednesday on 2nd March. As we have a BCP Eucharist on Wednesdays anyway we have taken to designating this service as our Ash Wednesday service for the whole mission community. That evening we will start our seven-week Diocesan Lent course called "Surprised by generosity".

Covid rules

As you will be aware, all plan B restrictions cease <u>from tomorrow</u> so there are no longer any legal restrictions in place and masks no longer have to be worn in church <u>from this Sunday</u> unless you want to of course.

30th January – The presentation of Christ (Candlemas)

I will be presiding at both services at St. Peter's, Rev. Margaret Scrivener will be presiding at All Saints at 9.30 and Rev. Chris Cant will preside at St. Michael's at 11.am.

Malachi 3: 1-5. The pairing of this lection with the presentation of Christ has its difficulties but nevertheless the messenger or "angel" (the word is the same in Hebrew) of the covenant will visit the Temple and bring in his wake a purifying new broom that will start by refining and re-ordering the worship of the Temple and then move to the social sphere and start to reorder unjust social structures. The prophets were always adamant that an acceptable religious cult must go hand in hand with working for social justice.

Hebrews 2: 14 – 18. As I preached last week about being set free from the fear of death, the reason for our confidence is made clear here. If Jesus wasn't a fully flesh and blood human, his resurrection would mean very little to any of us personally but human flesh and blood was raised on the third day, flesh and blood just like yours and mine. Resurrection is not reserved for demi-Gods, it is for all matter.

Luke 2: 22-40. Luke appears to have confused two different requirements of the law – the purification of Mary (similar to the old "churching of women" if you have long memories) and the presentation of a fist born male that requires no sacrifice. No matter, Luke was not Jewish so that is understandable. What is significant is that Jesus is recognised by two old sages, Simeon and Anna representing "old Israel", as the long-expected Messiah who would be responsible for the falling and rising of many in Israel (as prophesied in Malachi). Mary's personal torment at seeing her son tortured and executed is also alluded to as a sword piercing her heart.
