NEWS FROM DAVID & HEATHER IN UGANDA.

This update reminds us that they are coming to the end of their hot dry season with temperatures regularly 35C. The threat of attack from swarms of locusts, which many will have heard of in the media, is approaching, and the government proposes chemical spraying to save crops, but the downside is that bees and other pollinating insects will suffer, along possibly with health risks to humans and animals. Ebola is not far away and several have died from Yellow Fever. Although not likely, they fear the result if Corona Virus, should it reach them.



Care of the God's creation in the environment has always been uppermost in their work, particularly in agriculture, so a recent focus on the subject by the Archbishop of Canterbury as a Lent project has been greatly welcomed. Heather is particularly delighted as a new family are joining them of whom the father is a Doctor to work alongside her in the local Health Department. A new Archbishop of Uganda is about to be appointed, who they hope will be in sympathy with their particular work with agriculture and healthcare.

They ask for prayer for the following: Good rains to follow the dry season; protection from the various current threats to crops and health; that the new mission family will settle quickly and happily; for the new Archbishop of Uganda: for continued good health and stamina for David & Heather. ST. PETER'S CHURCH PCC REPORT 18th March 2020

The PCC meetings took place with appropriate social distancing measures. Some of the plans made were to be overtaken by circumstances and cancelled.

At the RMC meeting, Rev Martin spoke about the Coronavirus Support group which he is part of, based at the Medical Centre (01395 441212 www.budleighsupport.co.uk). Rev Karen suggested an 'umbrella system' to alleviate loneliness, supporting members of the congregation by phone. The villages already had community support systems in place. The weekly pew sheet to be continued with readings, sermons and up to date news (now only on line).

Safeguarding training for all PCC members will take place when the current situation was resolved.

Penny will keep the RMC website up to date.

At the St Peter's meeting Rev Karen said that there would be no collective worship and no communion. The cancellation of the APCM means that all current officers will remain in place.

Tony Gray will not stand as Treasurer at the next APCM. We need to seek a possible candidate to replace him.

Accident Books for the Church and the Kitchen are kept in the Parish Office. There will be a notice in Church explaining the procedure and initial contacts.

Rev Karen reported that the Youth Club had closed due to the pandemic and could only re-open if there were additional volunteers, who must have a DBS check and be willing to commit.

THE OLD TESTAMENT

The Old Testament of the Christian Bible is in essence identical to the Jewish Scriptures. For Jews, the first five books, the Torah, are especially holy and seen as mediated by Moses directly from God. The Tablets of the Law were actually handed to Moses by God on Mount Sinai. They were then carried around in the Arc of the Covenant for centuries until Solomon built the first Temple to provide a permanent home. The Old Testament comprises a large assortment of writings created over many centuries. It includes poetry, history, love stories (Ruth & The Song of Songs), religious and dietary rules and ceremonies, moral precepts and much else. How should modern Christians regard this huge body of writing, which Jesus himself endlessly quotes, usually as 'The Law and the Prophets', saying that He had come 'not to destroy but to fulfill'?

Virtually all Christian scholars agree that the Scriptures are inspired by God and are an important source of moral and spiritual precepts, wisdom and instruction, while much prefigures the Messianic work of Jesus - especially the extraordinary prophesies of Isaiah. Very few claim that Genesis gives us an accurate historical record of Creation. Some say we can - and should - examine scripture in the light of textual analysis, the secular and archaeological record, changes in Hebrew grammar and vocabulary over many centuries. For instance, it is clear that the Psalms were not all written by King David. They date from many different periods, some long after the Babylonian Exile, and are in many different styles. They have all, however, been used continuously by both Jews and Christians down the ages as an integral part of their worship.

At the Reformation, Protestants and the Church of England chose to exclude a number of books from the accepted canon of Scripture. Catholics and the Orthodox have always accepted these 'Apocryphal' books as Holy Writ. Most modern lectionaries do include many passages from the apocryphal books. Where we get into very deep waters is on moral questions which fundamentalists want to claim are settled by 'The Word of God' because they see the Bible as immutable for all time. Such are the supposed condemnation of all forms of same-sex relationship and the inferior role prescribed for women. That is hard to square with the rejection by all modern Christians of polygamy, concubinage, slavery, animal sacrifice and eye-for-an-eye vengeance. All those practices are firmly endorsed by the OT.

Many do not realise that much of the Holy Quran is a précis of the Old Testament. The original Muslims were also descended from Abraham through his son, Ishmael, born to Serai's slave Hagar. Hence Isa (Jesus) and Miriam (Mary) are both major Islamic prophets. Isa is seen as the precursor of Mohammed. Shalom. Bibli O'Phile
