The rescue of the twelve Thai children and their Football Coach from a flooded cave system over two miles from the entrance to the caves has amazed and surprised the world.

It is a testimony to what can be achieved against seemingly impossible odds by people all working together to achieve a common aim.

As such it stands as a metaphor for any enterprise where we are united in a common aim and all working together to achieve a common goal.

Their goal was to save the lives of those children. Our goal as a church is to 'save' lives as well.

We are to save people from the fear of death, to give hope even when they are suffering and give worth, purpose and meaning to lives that otherwise might succumb to nihilism and pointlessness.

You can call this offering 'healing' to people because we offer healing for their souls. This is our raison d'être as a church and when we are all sure of what and who we are and what we offer people, we can all direct our efforts in the same direction and achieve great things.

I'm sure the rescuers in Thailand are exhausted, mentally and physically, and there was at least one diver who died in the rescue effort. But this will not overshadow the sense of joy that they all must feel now that all the children have been rescued.

This is the same joy that we should feel over just one person whom we 'rescue' and not only are we not alone because we have each other, we also have Jesus who promised us "I will be with you always until the end of the age".

## REMEMBRANCE100

It is unlikely that you will not have realised that throughout the last 9 months or so there have been a lot of references in the Press and elsewhere to the 11th November 1918, the date of the end of the Great War, more commonly known as the First World War. Indeed in this Minimag, including this edition, we have been featuring a few details of anybody connected with Budleigh Salterton who died during, or as a result of, that war.

Also, of course, you will know that the Sunday nearest the 11th November, usually the second Sunday, each year has been commemorated as Remembrance Sunday. This has been so since King George Vth authorised it in 1919. This year it is being referred to as **Remembrance100** and it falls on the right day, Sunday 11th November 2018.

You may also have observed in the past that St Peter's flower arrangers have always used the traditional Poppies for the church decoration on Remembrance Sunday and the Sunday following each year. This year it will be slightly different. We will still be using poppies as the flowers for the church decoration but there will also be an opportunity for members of the Congregation to contribute to these decorations by adding a poppy (larger than the ones we put in our buttonholes) to a display at the back of the church. If you wish, these can be in memory of a family member or friend whom you know died as a result of this or any other conflict from July 1914 up to date. There will be a label on each poppy for you to add a name if you wish. Indeed, they can be in memory of any or all, un-named, who have died in those conflicts.

All we ask is for a donation to The Royal British Legion, which can be made in one of the special envelopes, which will be alongside the poppies at the back of the church. You then place your donation envelope into the Wall Box alongside the main, South West, door of the church.

Then, add any name you wish on the label attached to your poppy, and 'plant it' in to the display where you like. Job done! This display will be in position from the 1st November.

So there is time to think what you might like to do about this!

### THE PSALMS - The Rev Paul Hardingham

This month we begin a new series on the Psalms. Athanasius said: 'Most Scripture speaks to us; the Psalms speak for us.' They are powerful tools for devotion and prayer in our lives. We start by looking at Psalm 1, which sets the scene for the whole book. The psalm tells us how we can be blessed by God, as it contrasts the life of the righteous and wicked. How can we find true happiness in our discipleship?

Delight in God's Word: 'whose delight is in the law of the Lord, and who meditates on His law day and night.' (v2). Righteous people delight in God's Word: 'the most precious thing this world affords' (Coronation Service). They are preoccupied with the Word and don't miss any opportunity to meditate upon it. They recognise that by reading and studying the Word, God will speak into their lives and direct the way they live. Have we found this to be true ourselves?

Delight in God's Way: 'that person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither – whatever they do prospers.' (v3). How secure is our faith in difficult times? A tree can only survive storms with a good root system, which will also provide necessary water and nutrients for the tree to grow and flourish. Just like the tree, if we want a secure and fruitful Christian life, we must give space to our hidden life. This means giving time to reading God's word and praying, as we listen for his direction for our lives. Does what people see on the outside, reflect our inner life?

Dr Who's Tardis is bigger on the inside than the outside. To what extent is this true of our spiritual life?

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**Devon Remembers** 100 years on, we remember  
Honouring the 10th generation

**Lieutenant Eric Mursell HARTREE** died 8th August 1918 aged 25. He served with the Army Service Corps. He is remembered at the Beacon Cemetery, Saily-Laurette, France. Also on the Budleigh Salterton War Memorial and the brass plaque in St Peter's Church. There is an additional plaque in St Peter's on the right hand wall as you walk towards the Lady Chapel.

He was born in Beckenham, Kent, to John and Ida Hartree. His father was an Architect and came to Budleigh Salterton just before the War, first living at Green Gables, Well Hill and later at Westways, West Terrace. His father died in 1948. He was a well-known local Magistrate and Councillor and was involved with many other local associations.

Eric married Gwendolene Grace Lees earlier in 1918. She remarried in the 1920's and returned to her native Staffordshire.

**Sergeant 2/1548 Tristram Coplestone PALMER** died 26 August 1918 aged 31. He served with the New Zealand Field Artillery. He is remembered at the Bagneux British Cemetery, Gesaincourt, France and also on the Budleigh Salterton War Memorial, St Peter's brass plaque, East Budleigh War Memorial and Tablet in the church. His name is also listed on the New Zealand Roll of Honour.

He was born 28 June 1887 in East Budleigh, the youngest son of John and Mary Coplestone Palmer. He emigrated to New Zealand in 1906 as a farmer. He enlisted in 1914 and embarked from Wellington, NZ on 13 June 1915 and landed with the ANZACS at Gallipoli and fought through that campaign. He was then sent to France early 1916 and came to Budleigh on leave in April 1918 before being killed in August.

Tristram's father was a well-known local builder who died in April 1922 having been one of those who initiated the building of the War Memorial. His elder son John William Palmer (1885-1954), who also served with the Army in France, led the parade for the inauguration of the War Memorial on 11 November 1922.
