View from The Vicarage

Dear friends,

February has the reputation of being a dark dismal unremitting month so it might seem appropriate that Ash Wednesday falls on the 22nd when we recall our mortality, and at the Ash Wednesday service, I apply Ash to people's foreheads (if desired) accompanied by the words:

"From dust you came and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ."

Thus, with this reminder of our own mortality ringing in our ears, we enter the season of Lent where we strive to come into a better relationship with God and with our neighbour.

Traditionally this season is coloured by the notion of sacrifice and people usually having "given things up for Lent" but in recent years I've noticed a trend for "taking things on for Lent" because there are many ways in which we can establish a better relationship with God, and taking something up, for example, something simple like saying a prayer before meals, or reading some spiritual literature every day, or thanking people more than you would normally, has the benefit that it generally makes you feel good as well.

Of course, the Lenten tradition of sacrifice and self-examination leads up to the great celebration of Easter and it is a fact of life that you enjoy the highs much more after you have experienced the lows, which is why both great explosions of celebration and rejoicing in the Christian calendar of Christmas and Easter are both preceded by more sombre periods of reflection. Both Lent (before Easter) and Advent (before Christmas) lead us into a state of being that enables us to enjoy and appreciate more the heightened state of joy and celebration of both festivals. This makes sense on a human level because it is hard work trying to maintain a heightened level of enjoyment over a long period of time which has the effect of deadening the day of celebration itself.

For example, extending Christmas over a longer and longer time just ends up making the actual day itself a relief - just to get the whole thing over with. I recommend a bit of what they nowadays call "delayed gratification". Lent fulfils that role before Easter wonderfully.

An interesting note from Joy Hanson, Co-founder of St Bridget's Friends, on Otterton's historic connection with Syon Abbey, South Devon

I spent a couple of days in your lovely historic village recently to research the links with the Monastery of Syon Abbey. Between 1925-2011, Syon's last resting place was in my village of Rattery near South Brent. I had the privilege of being Monastic gardener with Sister Mary Bridget OSsS for four years, 1986-1990, and became fascinated by the history of this unique Monastery which was the only community to return after the Dissolution in mid C15.

In the village of Otterton lived a wealthy family by the name of Edwards. Maybe they lived in the prestigious medieval Manor House of Bicton Court before the ornate red brick house was built C18. Syon Abbey was one of three Monasteries founded by Henry V in 1415 and was on the River Thames in the beautiful setting of Isleworth, opposite where Kew Gardens is now. At that time it was a great privilege for a family to have daughters who were Nuns in this convent, as they were educated ladies. Dowries had to be provided and often a lady's maid would accompany them as well to become a Lay Sister assisting in menial work.

So in C15 Margaret (died 1516), Anne (died after 1539) and Elisabeth (died after 1539) Edwards went on a journey of about a week by sailing ship with Devon's wool and tin to London. The sea came up higher in the Otter valley at that time. They become postulants in the Abbey, then Novices, taking seven years to complete to their Final Professions, receiving the Bridgettine Crown. The Community were enclosed, with up to 63 Sisters and 13 Brothers. Their cousin Elisabeth Gybbes (died 1518) followed shortly after becoming the Fifth Great Abbess of Syon. Her family were in tin and had family houses in Venton Manor, Rattery, a chapel at Dartington Hall and a house near the Guildhall. She probably came often with her lady's maid and her mother to stay with her cousins from Exeter along the carriage ride past A La Ronde.

They may have walked sometimes to Mass in the Priory in Otterton which was connected with Mont St Michel, to listen to the wonderful chanting by the monks. There is a chapel in the grounds of Bicton estate.

A huge acreage was given to "The Monastery of St Saviour, St Mary and St Bridget of Syon Abbey in Middlesex", Otterton, Nonston, Harpford and East Budleigh, together with the waters and fishing rights of the River Otter for £1,727.14s 2d. This gave an annual rent of £9.12s. Syon's Martyr, St Richard Reynolds (died 1535) came from Pinhoe. The Church of Otterton was passed to Syon Abbey in C15, then bought by Richard Duke at the Dissolution of the Monasteries.

The village of Otterton is a living history with thatched farm cottages, the Mill and such lovely villagers who are playing out your part as the Custodians of history.
