A MESSAGE FROM THE REVD. MARTIN JACQUES

I think happiness is overrated! A bold statement you may think but only because I think that people may say they want to be happy but actually they mean they want peace and contentment.

I take that slightly more nuanced view — and we may be just talking semantics herein that I think a permanent state of happiness is unattainable and therefore unrealistic. What I think people call "happiness" is in fact what I recognise as contentment. Being content and at peace is what we all really want and can experience. Happiness and despair are both emotional highs and lows that appear and disappear at various times— hopefully transitory (certainly in the case of sadness and despair) and afterwards we return — God willing - to that more permanent state of peace and contentment.

At a Christian blessing in church, I don't wish people happiness, I evoke the blessing "the peace of God that passes all understanding", a state of mind / soul that Christians aspire to which has the power to transcend our physical, financial, and social constraints.

Knowing that we are all simultaneously an infinitesimally small fraction of an infinite universe and yet intimately loved by the God of all things brings with it a sense of our honoured place in this world's rich tapestry. Not transient but eternal, apparently insignificant and yet personally known and treasured. These truths give Christian believers a peace that transcends all understanding.

So, I pray for you all that you experience contentment and peace in your life, no matter what your personal situation. The happy times and the sad times will naturally come and go and we can learn from them, but they are oscillations around a hopefully contented and peace filled life.

New Devon Pilgrim Project Invites Us to 'Take a Journey of the Heart'

New pilgrimage routes linking Devon's historic churches and ancient holy sites are part of a new project launched at the Devon County Show. Devon Pilgrim aims to offer all the inspiration and information people need to "take a journey of the heart". It has been created by the Diocese of Exeter's Growing the Rural Church team, working with churches and other volunteers across the region. It provides routes across Devon where people can safely walk, following clear directions, so they can focus on the purpose of the journey rather than needing to find their way. Pilgrimage is having a resurgence, whether it is the Celtic idea of the inner journey or the medieval tradition of travelling to a specific place to seek help or ask for direction. Both of those are still current. People do look for direction in times of need or to understand the purpose of their life. We also have a greater awareness now of our own wellbeing.

The initial Devon Pilgrim routes are the Archangel's Way (from St Michael's, Brentor, to St Michael the Archangel, Chagford), the St Boniface Way from Crediton Parish Church to Exeter Cathedral and the Sacred Waters Way, which explores the spirituality of the river Dart from its source to sea. The Devon Pilgrim project has its own website with details of all the routes with step-by-step guides to download, information about walking safely, and how to make a pilgrimage perfect for you. **devonpilgrim.org.uk**



News from the Exmouth Food Bank

Although numbers are reducing, the Food Bank is still serving three times as many people as they were prior to the pandemic. Monthly graphs are available on the statistics page of their website, which you may find interesting. They are trialing a new idea which they are calling 'out of hours boxes.' These are emergency food boxes which they plan to deliver to a number of designated collection points, such as local churches, schools and community halls. This means if they get an emergency call for food and the request is outside of their normal operating

hours, they can arrange for the client to pick up the box. The box will provide enough food to last them until they are open again and can help with their ongoing needs. This month they are in need of: Tinned Vegetables (eg carrots, peas, sweetcorn, mushrooms), Tinned Tomatoes, Jars of Pasta Sauce, Tinned Fruit (eg fruit cocktail, pineapple, peaches) Tinned Rice Pudding and Tins & Packets of Custard.
