ST LUKE THE EVANGELIST - THE BELOVED PHYSICIAN

We celebrate the feast of St Luke on 18 October. To St Luke, a Gentile, we owe the beautifully written Gospel of Luke and the Book of Acts. He was a Greek physician, a disciple of St Paul, a companion on some of his missionary journeys, and an inspired writer.

Luke's gospel focuses on the compassion of Christ. His gospel contains some of the most moving parables, such as the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son. This, with his emphasis on poverty, prayer and purity of heart, makes up much of his appeal to the Gentiles, for whom he wrote. Women figure more prominently in Luke's gospel than any other — he is the only evangelist to describe the Annunciation and his gospel gives us the words of the Magnificat. He has stories of Mary, Elizabeth, and the woman who was a sinner

In Acts, Luke is remarkably good at linking sacred and profane history, as subsequent archaeology has shown. A principal theme of his Acts is how the early Christians moved away from Jerusalem into the pagan world, and especially on to Rome. Luke is the patron saint of doctors, surgeons and artists (it is believed he painted the Virgin Mary). His symbol is an ox, sometimes explained by reference to the sacrifice in the Temple at the beginning of his Gospel. In England 28 ancient churches were dedicated to him.

CHURCH MISSION SOCIETY

David and Heather report that fortunately Covid19 infections in Uganda are very low, with only 1259 cases in the whole of the country and only five deaths. Nevertheless, all schools, churches, bars and discos remain closed, with a night-time curfew and strict lock down and mandatory restrictions in place. Fortunately, Heather has been allowed to resume Health Centre visits. One sad downside of the lockdown has been a rise in malnutrition amongst young children and pregnant women. Also many girls who would normally have been at boarding school are now at home in the community, resulting in many cases of child pregnancy and child marriages. Some families struggling for money have been "selling" their daughters to older men for marriage. On the other hand, insistence on regular hand-washing has resulted in the virtual elimination of diarrhoea, normally a local scourge. The dreaded threat of nearby locusts failed to materialise, and with good recent rains crops are flourishing. They have also been able to plant 8000 trees. We are asked to give **thanks** for the low incidence of Corona Virus, the failure of locusts to arrive, and the elimination of diarrhoea, and to **pray** for those struggling for income, with no social security available, for the many girls at risk, and for a good season of rainstorms to maintain local food availability. **David & Heather Sharland's latest letter is on the Missions Board in Church.**

PCC Report

The PCC meetings took place on 9 September with appropriate social distancing measures. New government regulations had just been announced so changes may be necessary.

At the RMC meeting, it was agreed to hold an All Souls service to include the whole community, in conjunction with local funeral directors. Congregations at East Budleigh and Otterton had returned to normal, with St Peter's slightly down. APCMs must be held before 31 October. East Budleigh will be on the 15th October at 19.00, Otterton on the 25th at 12.15 and St Peter's on the 18th at 15.00. Filmed services are being compiled with input from all churches, the first being for Harvest Festival and the next for Christmas. They could be offered to local nursing homes. There is no collective worship or Open the Book in schools this term but it may be possible to film an Open the Book episode.

Events: A Loaves and Fishes lunch had taken place that day but the planned Solos lunch was unlikely to happen. Carol Services were unlikely. The East Budleigh Scarecrow Festival has been booked for 12/13 June and Otterton hoped to run the Open Gardens next year. The Budleigh Late Night Shopping was under review but there would definitely be no carols or procession. It was noted that Lucinda Stuart Banks had made a great start as the new Webmaster.

At the St Peter's meeting Tony Gray said that income was down 23,000 so far this year, less than the budget only due to the decision to postpone all Quinquennial works until 2021. A Gift Day had been fixed for Saturday 18 October. There will be a feature and photo in the One Magazine which is delivered to every household in BS and the villages and additional publicity in the town. Martin will sit just inside the porch to receive donations.

The Choir will return from Sunday 4 October. We are not allowed to sing hymns but they will sing the Introit, Agnus Dei and anthems during Communion.

APCM - Nominations will be requested for the PCC via the Pew Sheet and Mini-Mag.

Concern was expressed that the Christingle service was unlikely to take place. It normally raises approximately £500 for the Church of England Children's Society. It was agreed to hold a Retiring Collection for this charity on Sunday 20th December.

St. Peter's Anglican Church, like so many other organisations across the country, has been hit hard by the corona virus pandemic. The church hall at St. Peter's used to be in constant use and the church itself was a central hub of both the literary festival and the music festival.

So a community and cultural hub certainly but, most importantly, St. Peter's is a centre and symbol of Christian worship and presence in Budleigh Salterton. From the very first day we were allowed to open again we have been open for both Sunday and Wednesday worship and open daily for private prayer. Weddings, Funerals, and Baptisms can now take place with the appropriate restrictions in place. It often amazes people how expensive it is to run a church as big as St. Peter's which is financed entirely by the generosity of its congregation and supporters.
